MAKING IT WORK

For years, the soccer field has doubled as a path from the grade school leading to the high school. On sunny days it was fine. When it rained and snowed, the field became a swamp. Teachers would trudge their students the long way around, in between the church and Father's house. Everyone was soaked but mud-free. This alternate route turned icy during the winter months.

MAKING IT BETTER

While the school grounds were vacant in Spring 2020, administrators discerned it to be the proper time to get the ball rolling on these projects. At the same time, work was being done to remove a generations-old mobile classroom foundation just beneath ground-level on adjacent Cornerstone property. School administration approached these workers and Cornerstone to ask if they would consider adding to their workload. Resurfacing the field would prevent the flooding and installing concrete sidewalks would offer a safe path across the campus. With the players in place, it was approved by parish and school officials to get started.

And, it was with this same flavor of resolve, steadiness and faith in which a rather significant "face lift" was undertaken on the grounds of the school this past summer. This "project" originally got started more or less the morning of May 22 when Pat Ziegler began working his magic to remove the foundation (North across Court Street from the high school) of a many-years-past used mobile classroom. Pat initiated a "I wonder what would happen if we tried to do a little dirt work to enhance the overall view and landscape the complete grade school campus playground area?" Well, it went from there and an approach of, "Now that we are in the initial midst of this project, how can we take a more long-term approach to accomplish several long-needed projects?"

NEW AND IMPROVED

So it was with eager anticipation and a tremendous bear hug of an embrace St. John's began our first day of full-time, in-person classes on Thursday, August 20 – our 142nd continuous year of providing Catholic education in Beloit. . . Students, teachers and parents were welcomed to safe, appealing, freshly enhanced and significantly larger playgrounds campus.

Now that school has begun, teachers and students can navigate safely (and mud-free) between schools. The land is ready for endless P.E. activities and recess games. Students on the playground, and the cars on Main Street are kept to their designated areas by the fence.

And finally, for any project of this magnitude to be initiated and work towards a fruitful conclusion, an "all hands on deck" mindset and willing spirit of cooperation was needed from many parishioners – from kids, dads/moms, as well as City officials. This occurred in spades! A big THANK YOU to all who donated their time, most especially Dennis Lutgen, Nelson Palen, Pat Ziegler, and Cornerstone for spearheading and coordinating the project. The spirit of stewardship is alive and well in Beloit. Local government, private businesses, families, and individuals offered their time, talent, and treasure. St. John's has recently experienced a flavor of the stability, comfort, steadiness, resolve, and faith of our ancestors.

The main moving pieces of the project:

- 1) Tear up and reseeding of now firmly established hearty buffalo grass on the grade school playground, a playground area that was literally tripled by including recently acquired adjacent lots by Cornerstone and now made available for school/parish usage. This revamping of the playground included eliminating all above-ground obstructions.
 - 2) Installation of much-needed sidewalks, addressing a long-requested wish of the school!
- 3) Installation of a noble, dignified wrought iron fence bordering Main Street. As part of this process, gorgeous post rock pillars were interspersed.

Starting a New Adventure

Reg and Jan Konrade raised their six children in Abilene, Kansas: Fr. Konrade, his four brothers and one sister. They attended St. Andrew's Catholic Grade School until 5th grade and Abilene Junior High and High School. Father attended Sterling College, Newman University, Benedictine College, and Conception Seminary; earning a Bachelor of Liberal Arts-Philosophy Degree. He earned a Master of Divinity and Bachelor of Sacred Theology from the University of St. Mary of the Lake (Mundelein Seminary).

Fr. Konrade has been especially involved with the youth and vocational discernment in the Diocese since becoming a priest in 2005. He worked with Totus Tuus Ministries, a summer program for youth that develops faith and prayer life. Father also was involved with Prayer and Action in the

Salina Diocese for a hand full of years. Following ordination, Father accepted the position of vocations director for the Salina Diocese. He had the opportunity to travel across the diocese talking to young men about discerning the call to the priesthood.

From July 2015 to July 2020, Fr. Konrade was pastor at St. Nicholas of Myra Catholic Church in Hays, Kansas. St. John's has been blessed to have Father here since the first of July. He is very active in the Beloit community and can often be seen spending time with the students, whether that be in the classroom or on the playground, attending sporting events, visiting with families after Mass, or even participating in the Sunday evening Ultimate Frisbee game.
